"Many people perceived him as handsome or even beautiful. He evidenced an androgynous, Nijinsky-like quality. In physical features he reminded me of a Tartar from the Eastern European steppes, with slanted Mongolian eyes yet light skin. He was small. He was fine. He was a steady, nerveless competitor, completely lacking in personality or finesse: a generic Soviet-satellite skater who had been browbeaten into becoming a fine technician—less fine in free skating and more precise or womanlike in the school figures." – Toller Cranston

Ondrej Nepela was born on 22 January 1951 in Bratislava, Czechoslovakia (now Slovakia). He began ice skating at the age of seven and met his lifelong coach only two weeks later. (Continued on page 2)



GLHS held its third internet meeting of the year on December 8, 2020, with 22 members enjoying a program on filmmaker, actor and author Edward Davis Wood Jr., who directed a number of lowbudget science fiction, crime and horror films in the 1950s, including the cheesy Plan 9 from Outer Space (1959), regarded as one of the worst films of all time.



The presentation was given by Derwin Mak, an Award-winning Science Fiction Writer, stamp collector, Cachet maker and Exhibitor.

He was not naturally talented, but he was known for his humility and hard work. He competed at the 1964 Innsbruck and 1968 Grenoble Olympic Games. He was five-time European champion from 1969 to 1973, three-time World champion from 1971 to 1973, and won the gold medal in men's figure skating at the 1972 Sapporo Olympic Games.

A superstar in Czechoslovakia, Ondrej grew tired of having bodyguards and retired at the age of 23. He toured as a soloist with Holiday on Ice, then he moved to Germany and began coaching. In his autobiography, Toller Cranston described a brief 1973 relationship with him.

Ondrej Nepela died of complications due to AIDS on 2 February 1989.

The postcard is addressed to "Kim the Postmistress" of Rollingbay WA. It was postmarked June 17, 1997. Looking at Postmaster finder <u>https://</u> <u>webpmt.usps.gov/pmt002.cfm</u>, there were no Postmasters named "Kim". The Postmaster during that time was David L. Reid. Reid was the Postmaster from 05/28/1994 until Marlene Herman was named the Officer-in-Charge on 02/06/1998. David L. Reid moved and became the Postmaster of the Leesville Post Office (PO) in Texas on 02/14/1998. The Rollingbay PO did not have a Postmaster until 05/09/1998, Carolyn R. Leech.

The Rollingbay post office was established in 04/06/1892 and is still operating today. The 100+ year old building also houses Bay Hay and Feed and Rolling Bay Cafe'.



Rollingbay is a neighborhood community on Bainbridge Island, a 30-minute ferry ride from Seattle WA.


uel Clemens still rests on firm soil. We will survive but it would have been a pleasure to have met all of the members.

María Elena Walsh By John P. Stefanek

María Elena Walsh was born on 1 February 1930 and grew up in Ramos Mejía, just west of Buenos Aires. She learned to read and write early, under the influence of an artistic father. She learned about music from her father and by imitating the music theory of an older sister who enrolled in a conservatory. Her father would recite nursery rhymes to her, in English, which was of importance when she later decided to write literature for children.



She enjoyed drawing and painting, so for high school, she enrolled in the School of Fine Arts in Buenos Aires. She started writing poems in 1941, and she first published one of her poems, at the age of fifteen, in *El Hogar* magazine. In 1947, her book of poetry, Otoño imperdonable (Unforgivable Autumn), was published to unanimous praise. Buenos Aires went crazy for María Elena. She was invited to meet with Spanish poet Juan Ramón Jiménez in the United States and studied with him for six months.

Back in Argentina, she was kicked out of the school where she was teaching English, probably because she did not "comply" with the Peron-era fascistic educational direction. So, she decided to go to Paris with friend, and possible lover, Leda Valladares. They formed a music duo, "Leda y María," and sang mostly Argentine folk music at cafes and cabarets, such as La rose rouge, La fontaine de quatre saisons, and L'Écluse. They lived at the Grand Hôtel des Balcons in the heart of the Latin Quarter and performed at the legendary Crazy Horse.

After the Revolución Libertadora removed Peron from office, María Elena returned to Argentina in 1956. The duo released an album, *Entre valles y quebradas*, in 1957, and another album, *Las canciones de Maricastaña*, in 1958. Argentinians preferred to hear their folk music sung by male quartets, so the duo was never really embraced in their home country.

Television producer María Herminia Avellaneda hired the duo to do a program for Argentina's only television channel. She and María Elena became lovers. In 1959, María Herminia proposed creating a television program for children. María Elena's hit, *Doña Disparate y Bambuco* premiered in 1960. The following year, *Buenos Días, Pinky* appeared.

While in Paris, María Elena had decided to start writing for children, and wrote all the poems for *Tutú Marambá*, which

Tutú Marambá, which was published in 1960. Critics were almost unanimously enthusiastic. She released an album of songs for children, *Canciones para mirar*, in 1963.

Most of her works for children appeared between 1956 and 1967, including three TV programs, over a dozen books of poetry and/or songs, two works of theater, and six album recordings. She then decided to write for adults.



By the mid-1970s, her work had stopped. "I already said everything I had to say," she told interviewer and writer Gabriela Massuh. She would publish a few more works during the next thirty years.



In 1978, María Elena met photographer Sara Facio. They remained together until María Elena's death of bone cancer on 10 January 2011.



South America

Moche - pottery

MOCHE (Mochica) - c. 100 - 700 AD on north coast of Peru. Not a political state. The Moche produced clearly erotic pottery which in museums is separated from the general display of Moche crafts. Wikipedia states there are over 500 ceramics with sexual themes. Most are heterosexual, a few homosexual (both male-male and femalefemale) and several indeterminate. The depictions seem to be of common life and not of ritual. Probably the Moche didn't consider them erotic, much less pornographic.

CHIMU - c. 850 - 1470 AD on north coast of Peru. The Chimu replaced but did not conquer the Moche. It was a political state and as such was conquered by the Inca. There is Chimu pottery showing sexual acts but nowhere as many as in Moche pottery.

Inca - Machu Picchu

INCA - c. 1400 - 1532 AD originally in the south Peruvian Andes but it extended both north and west to the coast. It was a political state and as such was conquered by the Spanish. The Inca had set expectations of gender, coming of age celebration for boys and girls and a time of sexual experiences before adulthood at 20. The Spanish reported the Inca accepted homosexual and premarital activity. This was another moral justification for the Spaniards conquering.

EASTER ISLAND (Rapa Nui) - c. 1200 - 1900 AD on Pacific island 2000 miles from Chile.



Early European contacts report sexual licentiousness. The stone statues of Easter Island are clearly phallic -- to some eyes. Even if intentional, does it indicate anything more than a patrilineal society?

History on Stamps Journal, Bryan Manley-Green introduced us to LGBT links to the 2015 Netherlands stamps celebrating the 50th Anniversary of Top 40. He already mentioned the high-camp Vengaboys and their popularity with the LGBT community.

The tab se-tenant to the Vengaboys stamp features lyrics from their 1999 hit, "We're Going to Ibiza!"

In 1999, Roy Olivero (formerly Roy den Burger) was a member (the "cowboy") of the group.

He left in 2004 choosing to become a flight attendant six months later. He married his husband 14 years ago and has performed as Chrystal Conners, his showgirl alter-ego, in Rotterdam. The current Vengaboys "cowboy" is Donny Latupeirissa, who is also gay.



Energy Awareness Month By Lisa Foster

On October 20, 2020 I received three pieces of mail, all postmarked October 17, 2020. The mail was all philatelic in nature as one letter was regarding an annual membership renewal for the Machine Cancel Society, another an advertisement from a stamp dealer, and the third was a new membership application to GLHS.




They also all had the slogan spray on cancel "Energy Awareness Month". The United States Postal Service (USPS) observes Energy Awareness Month each October to help educate USPS employees about the organization's efforts to reduce energy and water usage and to become more sustainable.


USPS operates more than 31,000 Post Offices, branches, and other facilities across the United States. These facilities consume energy from all utility sources, including electricity, natural gas, heating oil, propane and steam.

The Postal Service's energy expenditures account for more than half of facility operating costs. The organization tracks and manages energy and water consumption, to minimize costs, but also to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and conserve natural resources.

The Postal Service has reduced energy usage at its facilities by 32.4 percent since 2003, while potable water usage has been reduced by 53.2 percent since 2007. There are 47,000 alternative fuel-capable vehicles in the Postal Services fleet.

To continue reducing energy consumption and costs, USPS is improving lighting in its facilities, using technology to better manage electrical and other repairs, and adding more renewable energy sources.





Grethe Cammermeyer

On October 02, 2020 I was able to attend a virtual symposium "Ignite Aging 2020" sponsored by my alma matter the University of Washington School of Nursing. I was thrilled to see and hear Colonel Grethe Cammermeyer playing the guitar and singing a song in the opening musical interlude.



Grethe was born in Oslo, Norway, on March 24, 1942, immigrating with her family in 1951, and gaining U.S. citizenship in 1960. At 19, she joined the Army Student Nurse Program and received a B.S. in Nursing in 1963 from the University of Maryland. She later earned an M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Washington School of Nursing.

Grethe met her wife Diane Divelbess in July 1988 in Lincoln City, Oregon. In 2012, after same-sex marriage was legalized in Washington state, Diane and Grethe were officially married on December 9th and became the first same-sex couple to get a license in Island County where they live on Whidbey Island.



In 1992, Col. Cammermeyer was the highestranking military officer discharged from service based on sexual orientation. She openly challenged the military's ban on gays and lesbians, filed suit and was reinstated in 1994 when her discharge was ruled unconstitutional. I can still envision Col. Cammermeyer marching proudly in full uniform in the Seattle Pride Parade with attendees loudly clapping, cheering, and standing in her honor.

Her autobiography, "Serving in Silence" was made into a TV movie in which Glenn Close portrayed Colonel Cammer-meyer and earned three Emmy awards and a Peabody award. It was one of the first films about a gay person in public service.

Col. Cammermeyer retired in 1997 after 31 years of service. As an outspoken advocate for the repeal of "Don't Ask, Don't Tell," she also served on the Military Advisory Council for the Servicemembers Legal Defense Network, and the Defense Advisory Committee on Women in the Services.

Literature Competition Results

The 2020 GLHS e-Journal was entered into the Chicagopex 2020 Literature Contest. The e-Journal received a score of 68 out of 100 points and was awarded a Silver. The areas for improvement included treatment (19 out of 30 points possible), Originality, Significance and Research (34 of 50 points possible), and Technical Matters (10 of 15 possible).

Comments included, "Writing style is inconsistent, from article to article", "Needs more philatelic information", "More research articles would improve the score. Most information in the journal is new issues rather than research. The Cecil Beaton article is quite good. More emphasis on the photos used in stamp designs would add to the philatelic content." And "Irregular spacing in text and misprints noted."

Previously, Joe Petronie, editor of the Lambda Philatelic Journal entered Volume 23 (2004) into Canada's 7th National Philatelic Literature Exhibit in 2005. The journal received a score of 64 out of 100 points and received a Silver Bronze award. The areas for improvement included research (4 out of 10), provision of member services (7 out of 15), and for more and longer, in depth articles.

Congratulation and thank you to all who submitted articles for publication in 2020.

I was in a queue for a book signing one late afternoon on December 23, 1999. The book with autographs would be a Christmas present to my boyfriend. Wenche Foss, a famous Norwegian theatre and film actress (loved as a diva by gays and others), had just had a semi-biographical book, *Etterpå (Afterwards)*, published. Along with Ms. Foss was the co-author of the book, Sturle Scholz Næró, a noted gay journalist.

After getting both autographs, a reporter-like guy approached Ms. Foss. He whispered something in her right ear. The news brought immediate tears to Ms. Foss and the book signing was finished for the day.

The news relayed to Ms. Foss was about the death of Per Aabel, her best friend. They had worked together in both theatre and film. As news of Per Aabel's death was released, it was announced that Foss and Aabel had just made arrangements to celebrate New Year 2000 together....

Per Aabel was born on April 25, 1902, in Oslo, Norway. His career began as a dancer, costume designer and choreographer while studying in France. His talent came through early. He obtained an extensive education as a theatre man in design at the École des Beaux Arts in Paris. He spent 2 years at the Russian Ballet School in London. He also studied and appeared with Max Reinhart in Vienna and Praha. Per Aabel had his debut as a dancer in 1921, and three years later as a choreographer. He arranged the layout of Ibsen's *Brand* in Paris in 1928.

As an actor, Aabel debuted in 1931 at Det Nye Theatre (The New Theatre) in Carlos Pinto's, *The Weak Sex.* He was director of the Carl Johan Theatre from 1933 to 1938. He worked at the Central Theatre for two years, and finally, joined the National Theatre in 1940.

At the Central Theatre, he was the popular man of the world in the boulevard comedy. He introduced a new realistic, human portrayal in his comedies and cabaret. He was able to carry this over to all types of work.

Aabel was the backbone of the ensemble and a living inspiration in the Norwegian theatre for 40 years. He played Henrik in *Henrik and Pernille*. Humour and human knowledge characterize his often personal form in Moliere's comedies like *Oronte*, *Tartuffe* and *Arvolpe*. He played Valentin in the *Adventure of Caivallet* and the Flers 600 times, both home and abroad. Irony and wit filled the portrait of Bernard Shaw in *Dear Liars* by Jerome Killy (Critics Prize, 1961). He interpreted many tragic fates and did them to the biggest scenic experiences in the Norweigan theatre in the 1970's: the old actor Clark in *The Sunshine Boys* by Neil Simon, the nervous patient Harry in *Home* by David Storey and the doctor in *Sunrise in Riga*.The day before Per died, he had dined alone at the restaurant frequented by famous theatrical artists, Theatrecaféen. It is across the street from the National Theatre. According to the news, those that saw him dining did not notice any signs of his pending death.

I opened Yahoo.com to research more on Per Aabel, hoping to find information on his private, gay life. Nothing new seems to have been written in any of the articles I found at Yahoo.

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I am not very familiar with Aabel since I have only lived in Norway for 10 years. Curiosity about him came when I saw him perform at his 90th birthday. (In Norway, it is a big party when one turns a round number in age. He was expecting to reach 100.) It was televised live and the show was supposed to be made for him. However, he made the show by reading a poem that made people more impressed.

He was known to be gay by close friends and the public, but it was rarely publicized. The media never seemed to make it a big story. This shows how much respect the public has for him, even after his death.

Mail Carriers & COVID-19 Screening By Lisa Foster

In an attempt to halt the spread of COVID-19 in long term care facilities, government officials implemented safety protocols including only allowing essential persons into facilities, and screening everyone prior to entering. Screening consisted of answering a set of questions regarding potential exposure to COVID-19, symptoms, and a temporal (forehead scanner) temperature measurement. In addition, individuals had to sign in and sign out for contact tracing requirements.

In Washington State mail carriers were refusing to be screened for symptoms prior to entering health care facilities. Reportedly, according to the mail carrier and postmaster, screenings were not required as part of their labor agreement. Other mail carriers refused to wear a mask while in facilities when requested. During the pandemic, facility doors have often been locked to prevent unscreened entry, and mail carriers can't legally leave the mail outside on the porch, but don't consistently ring the door bell to handoff the mail, which was delaying the residents receipt of mail.

On March 31, 2020 the USPS Newsroom released a COVID-19 Continuity of Operations Update (<u>https://about.usps.com/newsroom/</u> <u>service-alerts/pdf/policy-for-customers-requiring</u> <u>-visitor-medical-screenings-03312020.pdf</u>) which stated, "Our carriers have privacy protections under Federal laws – such as the Privacy Act and the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (as amended) – that may be violated if we require a carrier to be subjected to precautionary screenings by customers."

Alternatives to screening suggested were: 1) Opting to redirect mail to a mail receptacle inside or outside the building where screening would not be necessary, 2) Placing the mail on hold at the Post Office servicing this delivery. Mail and parcels can be held up to 30 days and will be available for customer pickup, 3) Forwarding mail to an alternate location. Long-term care residential facilities consist of short stay rehab centers, and skilled nursing facilities, but far more are the homes of the elders who live in them. This includes assisted living and independent over 55 communities, adult family homes and nursing homes. Expecting residents to not get their mail until after the pandemic is unreasonable. Conversely, expecting the facilities to allow the mail carriers in without first screening would be considered irresponsible and dangerous to those they serve.

Review of a July 15, 2020 statement by the President of the National Association of Letter Carriers (https://www.nalc.org/news/nalcupdates/body/7-15-20-statement.pdf) showed, "Today, almost 8,000 postal employees are under quarantine from the virus. Almost 27,000 previously quarantined postal employees have been cleared and returned to work. About 2,100 of the currently quarantined postal employees have tested positive for the virus, and another 500 plus are presumed to be positive. Another 3,000 postal employees who tested positive in the past have recovered and returned to work. Of all these numbers, about thirty percent are letter carriers. Sadly, 72 postal employees have passed away from the virus, including 15 city letter carriers."

One of America's Finest — Helen Hull Jacobs

woman of the 20th century, Helen Hull Jacobs was known for her powerful serve and overhead smash on the tennis court. Born August 6, 1908, Jacobs learned to play tennis as a young girl at the Berkeley Tennis Club.

In 1923, she was inspired by watching Helen Wills win the US National Championship (now known as the US Open). In 1929, this inspiration led Jacobs to focus more seriously on tennis.

While attending the University of California at Berkeley, Jacobs was coached by Hazel Wightman, one of the premier early women's tennis players and founder of the Wightman Cup (Figure 1), an event in which Jacobs competed 10 times from 1927 to 1939.

During her tennis career, Jacobs held nine Grand Slam titles: five single titles, three doubles titles and one mixed doubles title. Throughout the 1930s, Jacobs captivated the fans whenever she played her rival, Helen Wills Moody. These competi-

tive competitions between Jacobs and Moody were soon deemed by media and sportswriters as "the Battle of the Two Helens" (Figure 2).

In 1933, Jacobs earned her only victory over Moody at the US Championships, leading 3-0 when Moody retired from the match with a back injury. Then in 1935, the two met again at the Wimbledon Championships. Jacobs played well and obtained match-point but it wasn't enough. Jacobs ended up losing the match to Moody. Reports state their competitive competitions were the precursor to the

rivalries between Chris Evert and Martina Navratilova, Steffi Graf and Monica Seles and Venus and Serena Williams.

Known for her inexhaustible spirit and graciousness, Jacobs brought women's competitive tennis to the forefront. In 1933, Jacobs was the first female to be named as the Associated Press Female Athlete of the year. In that same year, Jacobs popularized a new look in tennis for women when she walked onto the Wimbledon court wearing tailored shorts (Figure 3), breaking the tradition of women wearing floor-length skirts, stockings and long-sleeved tops. On September 14, 1936, she donned her new look on the cover of *Time Magazine* (Figure 4).

Even with only one Wimbledon title in 1936, Jacobs was considered one of America's finest tennis players.

Additionally, Jacobs served as a lieutenant in the US Navy, then as a public relations officer at the Naval Reserve Training School. Then in 1943, Jacobs took a hiatus from tennis to join WAVES (Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service), a division of the US Naval Reserve. During World War II, she left the reserve to serve as a US Navy Intelligence officer. After WWII, she rejoined the reserve until 1950 when she returned to active duty for the Korean War. Jacobs retired from the Navy in 1968 with the rank of commander. Up to that time, she was one of only five women in the Navy to have earned that rank.

Jacobs retired from playing tennis in 1947 (Figure 5) to pursue her life-long dream of being a writer, her second full time career. She authored 19 books, including an autobiography, children's

books, historical novels and several books on tennis (Figure 6). While writing, Jacobs also worked as a designer of women's sportswear.


Her personal life was an open book. Jacobs was known to have been a lesbian, having two same-sex relationships in her lifetime. Her first relationship was with Henrietta Bingham from 1934-1943. Later in life, she entered into a relationship with partner Virginia Gurnee which lasted until Jacobs' death on June 2, 1997.

Although Jacobs was never honored by the postal service on a stamp, she was inducted into two halls of fame for her phenomenal tennis career. In 1962, she was inducted into the International Tennis Hall of Fame in Newport, Rhode Island (Figures 7 & 8). The National Gay and Lesbian Sports Hall of Fame in Chicago inducted her in 2015.



Timothy Ray Brown

Timothy Ray Brown, the first person cured of HIV, died of cancer on September 29, 2020 at the age of 54. Although born in Seattle, WA he made history as the "Berlin patient" a term to preserve his anonymity when his cure was first announced at the 2008 Conference of Retrovirus and Opportunistic Infections.

Brown was working in Berlin as a translator when he was diagnosed with HIV in the 1990s and began antiretroviral therapy. In 2006, Brown was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia. Bone marrow transplants are a known effective blood cancer treatment, but Brown's physician, Dr. Gero Huetter wanted to try to cure the HIV infection as well by using a donor with a rare gene mutation "delta32" on the CCR5 receptor that gives natural resistance to the AIDS virus.

Brown stopped taking antiretroviral medication on the day of the first transplant in 2007 and three months later the HIV levels were undetectable, and his T cell count increased. The transplant was only partly successful: His HIV seemed to be gone but his leukemia was not. He had a second transplant from the same donor in 2008 and the result was him testing negative for HIV and remission of the leukemia.

He came forward and made his name public in late 2010 and continued to test negative for the virus that causes AIDS. In 2019 it was revealed that Brown was terminally ill from a recurrence of leukemia. Timothy Ray Brown passed away at his home in Palm Springs, California.

In 2019, it was announced that a second man had been cured of HIV with a similar treatment; he was called the "London Patient". The patient Adam Castillejo revealed his identity in March 2020.

Because such donors are rare and transplants are medically risky, researchers have been testing gene therapy and other ways to try to get a similar effect. At the AIDS 2020 conference in July, researchers announced they may have achieved a long-term remission from the virus in a Brazil man by using an intensified cocktail of antiretroviral drugs.

Edmund Goulding

(1891-1959) was a British screenwriter and director best remembered for directing *Love* (1927), *Grand Hotel* (1932), *Dark Victory* (1939), and *The Razor's Edge* (1946). He was born in London's East End and emigrated to the United States after enlisting in World War I. He married Marjorie Moss, and his preference for males at co-ed sex parties hosted by him was widely known in Hollywood.

Mauritz Stiller (1883-1928) was born in Helsinki but fled to Sweden after being drafted into the army of Czar Nicholas II. He acted, wrote, and directed in Sweden's silent film industry. His 1916 film, *Vingarne (The Wings)*, features one of the first representations of homosexuality on film. He had a relationship with actor Nils Asther. Mauritz is probably best known for "discovering" Greta Garbo, casting her in his film, *The Saga of Gösta Berling*. With an offer to direct for Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, he moved to Hollywood, bringing Greta along.

Edgar Allan Woolf (1881-1943) was a lyricist, playwright, and screenwriter, best known for cowriting the film, *The Wizard of Oz*. He graduated from Columbia University and acted in the Murray Hill Stock Company before writing sketches and plays. He wrote the lyrics for the 1918 song, "You're So Cute, Soldier Boy." He moved to Hollywood in the early 1930s to write screenplays for Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer. He was described by Samuel Marx, MGM's story editor, as a "wild, red -haired homosexual."

Salka Viertel (1889-1978) was born in Sambor in the province of Galicia in the Austro-Hungarian Empire (now western Ukraine). She acted in Vienna and married Berthold Viertel in 1918 (they divorced in 1947). They moved to Hollywood in 1928 where Salka acted and wrote scripts while under contract with Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer. She helped found the European Film Fund which worked to enable film artists escape Nazi Germany. She was close to Greta Garbo and fell in love with Eleonora von Mendelssohn.

George Oppenheimer (1900-1977) was an American screenwriter, playwright, and journalist who graduated from Williams College. He cofounded The Viking Press in 1925 and began his screenwriting career at Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer in 1933. He received an Oscar nomination for *The War Against Mrs. Hadley* in 1942. He joined *Newsday* newspaper in 1955, eventually becoming its daily and Sunday drama critic. He was an occasional lover of gay rights activist Harry Hay. On 12 June 2020, Djibouti released a miniature
